Ovarian Cancer Facts

The Problem

One of the deadliest diseases women face is ovarian cancer. This "silent" killer is often misdiagnosed with no obvious symptoms until late in its development. By the time it is diagnosed, the cancer often has spread throughout the abdomen, requiring invasive treatment with no assurance of success. Among those who fell victim to ovarian cancer are familiar names: Gilda Radner, Madeline Kahn, and Jessica Tandy—just to name a few.

Early Detection

With a series of simple diagnostic tests to detect ovarian cancer in its earliest stages, many cancers can be treated with more effective and possibly non-surgical therapies. New "site directed" chemotherapies are being developed by researchers that can more efficiently eradicate the cancer with a minimum of toxic side effects.

Did you Know?

According to the American Cancer Society, ovarian cancer is the eighth most common cancer in women (not counting skin cancer). It ranks fifth as the cause death in women. In 2006, it was estimated that there were 20,180 new cases of ovarian cancer in this country; 3 out of 4 women diagnosed will die because of the disease. If diagnosed in early stages, the five year survival rate is over 90%, but only 19% of the cases are diagnosed early.

While the rate of ovarian cancer has gone down by 0.7% per year since 1985, a woman's risk of getting ovarian cancer during her lifetime is about 1 in 67. Ovarian cancer is the deadliest of the gynecological cancers.
